




Synopsis of The Color Purple by Alice Walker

BIOGRAPHY OF ALICE WALKER

Alice Walker is an American writer, poet, and activist born on February 9, 1944, in Eatonton, Georgia. She is widely recognized as one of the most influential African-American writers of the 20th century. Walker grew up in the midst of the Jim Crow era, where racial and social segregation persisted in the United States.

Raised in an intellectually and socially aware farming family, her grandfather was a prominent figure in the Georgia ethnic community, the

A.M.E. Zion Church. Despite a challenging childhood, her family's commitment to education helped shape her strong vision for social justice and human rights.

Alice Walker pursued higher education at Spelman College, a historically black women's college in Atlanta. After graduating, she continued her studies at Sarah Lawrence College.
