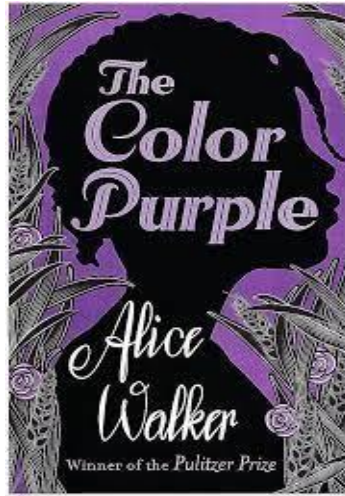

Synopsis of *The Color Purple* by Alice Walker

BIOGRAPHY OF ALICE WALKER
