APPENDIX I

Donald Trump's 11th March 2020 Speech

My fellow Americans, tonight I want to speak with you about our nation's unprecedented <u>response ⁽¹⁾</u> to the coronavirus outbreak (1) that started in China (2) and is now spreading throughout the world (3).

Today, the World Health Organization officially announced that this is a global pandemic (4).

We have been in frequent <u>contact (2)</u> with our allies (5), and we are marshaling the full <u>power (3)</u> of the federal government and the private sector (6) to protect the American people (7).

This is the most aggressive and comprehensive effort (8) to confront a foreign virus (9) in modern history. I am confident that by <u>counting (4)</u> and <u>continuing (5)</u> (10) to take these tough <u>measures (6)</u> (11), we will significantly reduce the <u>threat (7)</u> to our citizens (12), and we will ultimately and expeditiously defeat this virus (13).

From the <u>beginning</u> ⁽⁸⁾ of time, nations and people have faced unforeseen <u>challenges</u> ⁽⁹⁾, including large-scale and very dangerous health <u>threats</u> ⁽¹⁰⁾ (14). This is the way it always was (15) and always will be (16). It only matters (17) how you respond (18), and we are responding with great speed and professionalism (19).

Our team is the best anywhere in the world (20). At the very <u>start (11)</u> of the outbreak, we instituted sweeping travel <u>restrictions (12)</u> on China (21) and put in place the first federally mandated <u>quarantine (13)</u> in over 50 years (22). We declared a public health <u>emergency (14)</u> (23) and issued the highest level of travel <u>warning</u> (<u>15)</u> on other countries (24) as the virus spread its horrible <u>infection (16)</u> (25).

And taking early intense <u>action (17)</u>, we have seen dramatically fewer cases of the virus in the United States (26) than are now present in Europe (27).

The European Union failed (28) to take the same <u>precautions (18)</u> (29) and restrict <u>travel (19)</u> from China and other hot spots (30). As a result, a large number of new <u>clusters (20)</u> in the United States were seeded by travelers from Europe (31).

After <u>consulting ⁽²¹⁾</u> with our top government health professionals, I have decided to take several strong but necessary <u>actions ⁽²²⁾</u> (32) to protect the health and well-<u>being ⁽²³⁾</u> of all Americans (33).

To keep new cases from <u>entering ⁽²⁴⁾</u> our shores (34), we will be suspending all <u>travel ⁽²⁵⁾</u> from Europe to the United States for the next 30 days (35). The new <u>rules ⁽²⁶⁾</u> will go into <u>effect ⁽²⁷⁾</u> Friday at midnight (36). These <u>restrictions ⁽²⁸⁾</u> will be adjusted subject to <u>conditions²⁹</u> on the ground (37).

There will be <u>exemptions³⁰</u> for Americans (38) who have undergone appropriate <u>screenings</u> ⁽³¹⁾ (39), and these <u>prohibitions</u> ⁽³²⁾ will not only apply to the tremendous amount of <u>trade</u> ⁽³³⁾ and cargo, but various other things (40) as we get <u>approval</u> ⁽³⁴⁾ (41). Anything coming from Europe to the United States is what

we are discussing (42). These <u>restrictions ⁽³⁵⁾</u> will also not apply to the United Kingdom (43).

At the same time, we are monitoring the <u>situation ⁽³⁶⁾</u> in China and in South Korea (44). And, as their situation improves (45), we will re-evaluate the <u>restrictions ⁽³⁷⁾</u> and <u>warnings ⁽³⁸⁾</u> (46) that are currently in place for a possible early <u>opening ⁽³⁹⁾</u> (47).

Earlier this week, I met with the leaders of health insurance industry (48) who have agreed (49) to waive all co-payments for coronavirus <u>treatments ⁽⁴⁰⁾</u>, extend insurance <u>coverage ⁽⁴¹⁾</u> to these <u>treatments ⁽⁴²⁾</u> (50), and to prevent surprise medical <u>billing ⁽⁴³⁾</u> (51).

We are cutting massive amounts of red tape (52) to make antiviral therapies available in record time (53). These <u>treatments (44)</u> will significantly reduce the <u>impact (45)</u> and <u>reach (46)</u> of the virus (54).

Additionally, last week, I signed into $\underline{law}^{(47)}$ an \$8.3 billion funding <u>bill</u>⁽⁴⁸⁾ (55) to help C.D.C. and other government agencies (56) fight the virus (57) and support vaccines, <u>treatments</u>⁽⁴⁹⁾, and <u>distribution</u>⁽⁵⁰⁾ of medical <u>supplies</u>⁽⁵¹⁾(58). <u>Testing</u>⁽⁵²⁾ and testing <u>capabilities</u>⁽⁵³⁾ are expanding rapidly, day by day (59). We are moving very quickly (60).

The vast majority of Americans: The <u>**risk** ⁽⁵⁴⁾ is very, very low (61). Young and healthy people can expect to recover fully and quickly (62) if they should get the virus (63). The highest <u>**risk** ⁽⁵⁵⁾ is for elderly population with underlying health **<u>conditions</u>** ⁽⁵⁶⁾ (64). The elderly <u>**population**</u> ⁽⁵⁷⁾ must be very, very careful (65).</u></u>

In particular, we are strongly advising (66) that <u>**nursing** ⁽⁵⁸⁾ homes for the elderly (67) suspend all medically unnecessary <u>visits</u> ⁽⁵⁹⁾ (68). In general, older Americans should also avoid nonessential <u>travel</u> ⁽⁶⁰⁾ in crowded areas (69).</u>

My administration is coordinating directly with communities with the largest outbreaks (70), and we have issued <u>guidance ⁽⁶¹⁾</u> on school <u>closures ⁽⁶²⁾</u>, social <u>distancing ⁽⁶³⁾</u> and <u>reducing ⁽⁶⁴⁾</u> large <u>gatherings ⁽⁶⁵⁾</u> (71).

Smart <u>action $^{(66)}$ </u> today will prevent the <u>spread $^{(67)}$ </u> of the virus tomorrow (72).

Every community faces different <u>**risks** ⁽⁶⁸⁾ (73) and it is critical for you (74) to follow the guidelines of your local officials (75) who are working closely with our federal health experts (76) — and they are the best (77).</u>

For all Americans, it is essential (78) that everyone take extra <u>precautions</u> (69) and (79) practice good hygiene (80). Each of us has a <u>role (70)</u> to play in defeating this virus (81). Wash your hands (82), clean often-used surfaces (83), cover your face and mouth (84) if you sneeze or cough (85), and most of all, if you are sick or not feeling well (86), stay home (87).

To ensure that working Americans impacted by the virus (88) can stay home without <u>fear (71)</u> of financial <u>hardship (72)</u> (89), I will soon be taking emergency <u>action (73)</u> (90), which is unprecedented (91), to provide financial <u>relief (74)</u> (92). This will be targeted for workers (93) who are ill (94), quarantined (95), or caring for others due to coronavirus (96).

I will be asking Congress (97) to take legislative <u>action (75)</u> (98) to extend this <u>relief (76)</u> (99).

Because of the economic <u>policies (77)</u> that we have put into place over the last three years (100), we have the greatest economy anywhere in the world, by far (101).

Our banks and financial institutions are fully capitalized and incredibly strong (102). Our <u>unemployment ⁽⁷⁸⁾</u> is at a historic low (103). This vast economic <u>prosperity ⁽⁷⁹⁾</u> gives us <u>flexibility ⁽⁸⁰⁾</u>, reserves, and resources (104) to handle any <u>threat ⁽⁸¹⁾</u> (105) that comes our way (106).

This is not a financial crisis; this is just a temporary moment of time (107) that we will overcome together as a nation and as a world (108).

However, to provide extra <u>support ⁽⁸²⁾</u> for American workers, families, and <u>businesses ⁽⁸³⁾</u> (109), tonight I am announcing the following additional <u>actions ⁽⁸⁴⁾</u> (110): I am instructing the Small Business Administration (111) to exercise available <u>authority ⁽⁸⁵⁾</u> (112) to provide capital and <u>liquidity ⁽⁸⁶⁾</u> to firms (113) affected by the coronavirus (114).

Effective immediately, the S.B.A. will begin providing economic <u>loans ⁽⁸⁷⁾</u> in affected states and territories (115). These low-interest <u>loans ⁽⁸⁸⁾</u> will help small <u>businesses ⁽⁸⁹⁾</u> (116) overcome temporary economic <u>disruptions ⁽⁹⁰⁾</u> (117) caused by the virus (118). To this end, I am asking Congress (119) to increase <u>funding ⁽⁹¹⁾</u> for this program by an additional \$50 billion (120). Using emergency <u>authority $^{(92)}$ </u>, I will be instructing the Treasury Department (121) to defer tax <u>payments $^{(93)}$ </u>, without interest or <u>penalties $^{(94)}$ </u>, for certain individuals and businesses (122) negatively impacted (123). This <u>action $^{(95)}$ </u> will provide more than \$200 billion of additional <u>liquidity $^{(96)}$ </u> to the economy (124).

Finally, I am calling on Congress (125) to provide Americans with immediate payroll tax <u>relief (97)</u> (126). Hopefully they will consider this very strongly (127).

We are at a critical time in the <u>fight ⁽⁹⁸⁾</u> against the virus (128). We made a lifesaving <u>move ⁽⁹⁹⁾</u> with early <u>action ⁽¹⁰⁰⁾</u> on China (129). Now we must take the same action with Europe (130). We will not delay (131). I will never hesitate (132) to take any necessary steps (133) to protect the <u>lives ⁽¹⁰¹⁾</u>, health, and <u>safety ⁽¹⁰²⁾</u> of the American people (134). I will always put the well <u>being ⁽¹⁰³⁾</u> of America first (135).

If we are vigilant (136) — and we can reduce the <u>chance (104)</u> of infection (137), which we will — we will significantly impede the <u>transmission (105)</u> of the virus (138). The virus will not have a <u>chance (106)</u> against us (139).

No nation is more prepared or more resilient than the United States (140). We have the best economy, the most advanced health <u>care (107)</u>, and the most talented doctors, scientists and researchers anywhere in the world (141).

We are all in this together (142). We must put politics aside (143), stop the **partisanship** (108) (144) and unify together as one nation and one family (145).

As history has proven time and time again (146), Americans always rise to the <u>challenge ⁽¹⁰⁹⁾</u> (147) and overcome <u>adversity ⁽¹¹⁰⁾</u> (148).

Our future remains brighter (149) than anyone can imagine (150). <u>Acting</u> (<u>(111)</u> with <u>compassion</u> (<u>(112)</u> and <u>love</u> ((113)), we will heal the sick (151), care for those in <u>need</u> (((114)) (152), help our fellow citizens (153) and emerge from this <u>challenge</u> (<u>((115))</u> stronger and more unified than ever before ((154)).

God bless you (155), and God bless America (156). Thank you (157).
