

Al Jazeera Cameraman Killed and Bureau Chief Injured in Gaza

The journalists were covering the aftermath of airstrikes at a U.N. school-turned-shelter in Khan Younis. The bureau chief's wife, son, daughter and grandson had been killed in October.

(1) An Al Jazeera cameraman was killed and the network's Arabic-language Gaza Strip (2) bureau chief was wounded on Friday during an attack in southern Gaza, Al Jazeera (3) said, the latest in a long string of journalist casualties in the war.	[1]
(4) The cameraman, Samer Abu Daqqa, and Wael al-Dahdouh, the bureau chief, were (5) covering the aftermath of airstrikes at a U.N. school-turned-shelter in Khan Younis (6) when both were wounded, the network said. Mr. al-Dahdouh told Al Jazeera that he (7) was able to walk out of the area and seek help. Mr. Abu Daqqa bled to death from his (8) injuries, as emergency medical help was unable to reach him, the network said.	[2]
(9) Mr. Abu Daqqa, 45, was the 13th Al Jazeera journalist killed since the network (10) opened in 1996, according to Al Jazeera.	[3]
(11) His funeral was held in Khan Younis on Saturday. Al Jazeera televised part of his (12) funeral, where Mr. al-Dahdouh spoke alongside dozens of other colleagues, family (13) members. Fellow journalists, including Mr. al-Dahdouh, wept in anguish, some (14) caressing the cameraman's bloodied face. His press flak jacket and blue helmet (15) rested atop his shrouded body. Mr. al-Dahdouh accused Israeli forces of targeting (16) dozens of journalists, their offices and their families. "We will continue to do our (17) duty with the best professionalism and transparency," despite the targeting of (18) journalists, he said. "We will carry our message."	[4]

U.N. Chief Says Gaza Death Toll is 'Unacceptable' as It Passes 25,000

Palestinian authorities said on Sunday that more than 25,000 people had been killed in the Gaza Strip in the Israel's military response to the Oct. 7 attacks.

(1) Israel's military operation in Gaza has led to destruction and killing on a scale that is "utte	erly
(2) unacceptable," the United Nations' secretary general, António Guterres, said on Sunday a	ıS
(3) Palestinian authorities said that the death toll in the territory since the start of the campai	ign
(4) had surpassed 25,000.	[1]

- (5) Mr. Guterres called for an immediate humanitarian cease-fire in Gaza that would allow aid to (6) to reach all those in need, and to facilitate the release of hostages taken during an attack on (7) Israel led by Hamas on Oct. 7, during which Israeli authorities say around 1,200 people were (8) killed. More than 100 hostages remain in captivity. [2]
- (9) In response to the Oct. 7 attack, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu began a campaign of (10) airstrikes in Gaza and a ground invasion in a bid to eradicate Hamas. The government also (11) declared a siege of Gaza, which has a population of about 2.2 million people. [3]
- (12) Israel's government says that civilian casualties are a tragedy, but it argues that it bombards (13) residential areas because Hamas hides its forces among the civilian population and has built (14) an extensive network of tunnels, some of them beneath hospitals. It also says that it warns (15) civilians to move to areas away from the fighting.

- (16) Almost all of Gaza's population has been displaced because of Israel's military campaign, (17) and international groups say the aid that is making it into Gaza is a small fraction of what is (18) necessary to stem the humanitarian crisis that has played out over the last three months. [5]
- (19) "This is heartbreaking," Mr. Guterres said about the loss of life. He was speaking in the(20) Ugandan capital, Kampala, during a summit that aims to increase trade and investment(21) between nations in parts of the world that are less economically developed.[6]
- (22) "The Middle East is a tinderbox," he said. "We must do all we can to prevent conflict(23) igniting across the region."

- (36) U.S. and Israeli government officials have sometimes cast doubt on the casualty numbers,

(28) "We were attached to this baby in a crazy way," he said, speaking near her grave (29) in a cemetery in Rafah. [12]
(30) "God had taken something from us but given us something in return", said the (31) uncle, with the baby surviving after her family died. [13]
(32) "But [now] he has taken them all. My brother's family is completely wiped out. (33) It's been deleted from the civil registry. There is no trace of him left behind."[14]
(34) The baby is among more than 14,000 children who have been killed in Israeli (35) attacks on Gaza since the war began on October 7. [15]
(36) More than 34,300 Palestinians across the besieged Palestinian enclave have (37) been killed. [16]

Baby Born in Gaza After Her Mother Was Killed Has Died

The birth of the girl, captured on video, brought a glimmer of hope to war-torn Gaza, but she died of respiratory problems after five days, her uncle said.

(1) A baby who was delivered through an emergency cesarean section after her mother (2) was killed in an Israeli strike died on Thursday, a relative said, less than a week after (3) news of her birth brought a glimmer of hope to war-torn Gaza.	
(4) The baby, who was born prematurely after a strike in southern Gaza that also killed (5) her father and sister, suffered respiratory problems, and doctors were unable to save (6) her, said her uncle, Rami al-Sheikh.	
(7) "I buried her in her father's grave," he said in a phone interview on Friday. [3]
(8) The mother, Sabreen al-Sakani, was killed along with her husband, Shukri, and their (9) 3-year-old daughter, Malak, when an Israeli strike hit their home in the city of Rafak (10) shortly before midnight last Saturday. Rescue crews took the bodies to the Emirati (11) Hospital in Rafah, where doctors performed a cesarean section on Ms. al-Sakani, (12) who was 30 weeks pregnant.	1
(13) The girls' uncle said that Malak had wanted to name her little sister Rouh, the (14) Arabic word for soul. The extended family decided instead to name her after her (15) mother, Sabreen.	.]
(16) Sabreen weighed just three pounds at birth, said Dr. Mohammed Salama, head of (17) the neonatal intensive care unit at Emirati Hospital. Her birth was captured on (18) video by a journalist from the Reuters news agency, who filmed doctors providing (19) artificial respiration to her after she emerged, pale and limp, from her mother.
