## Author Biography

Katherine Paterson grew up in a Christian family, traveled around the world early on, and studied different cultures, including Chinese. Katherine Paterson's best books combine a little of all her experiences on her journey to becoming a renowned and award-winning author.

Paterson's middle-class novels address challenging subjects such as sibling rivalry, troubled children, and even death. The sensitive yet realistic expression of his childhood emotions has touched readers young and old around the world. After receiving two Newbery Medals and one Newbery Honor, Paterson was awarded the 1998 Hans Christian Andersen Medal for her work. She became the fifth American writer to receive this international award for making lasting contributions to children's literature.

The daughter of two missionaries, Katherine Paterson spent the first five years of her life in China. When Japan invaded during World War II, her family returned to the United States. By the age of 18, Paterson had moved more than 18 times with her family. After studying English literature in Tennessee and biblical and Christian education in Virginia, Paterson moved to Japan as a missionary. She fell in love with Japan and stayed for four years.

Then after returning to the United States in 1961, Katherine met and married John Paterson, a Presbyterian minister in Buffalo, New York. In 1966, the Patersons had three children, two of whom they adopted. When she's not busy taking care of





her family, she spends her time writing, although it took nine years before her first novel was published.

In the early 1980s, Katherine Paterson established her prestigious position in children's literature. In 1978, she won the Newbery Medal for *Bridge to Terabithia*. The following year, *The Great Gilly Hopkins* won the Newbery Prize, and just two years after that, *Jacob Have I Loved* won the 1981 Newbery Medal. In addition to middle-class novels, Paterson has written picture books and stories for young children, including the popular Marvin series.
