A. Synopsis of the Novel

Then Elinor was told that Mr. Ferrars was married. Believing that the Mr. Ferrars in question was Edward, he was surprised and relieved to learn that Lucy had married

Edward's brother, Robert. Edward finally arrived at Barton Cottage and proposed to Elinor, whom they eventually married.

B. Biography of The Author

Jane Austen was born in 16 December 1775 on Steventon, Hampshire, England, and died in 18 July 1817 on Winchester, Hampshire. She is the English woman writer who first gave novels her modern character through her treatment of ordinary people in everyday life. She published four novels during her lifetime: Sense and Sensibility (1811), Pride and Prejudice (1813), Mansfield Park (1814), and Emma (1815).
