#### **Biography of Michael W. Punke**

Michael W. Punke is an American writer, novelist, professor, policy analyst, policy consultant, lawyer, and former United States Trade Representative and US Ambassador to the World Trade Organization in Geneva, Switzerland. He is currently the Vice President of Public Policy for Amazon Web Services. He is best known for writing The Revenant: A Novel of Revenge (2002), which was adapted into a film as The Revenant (2015), directed by Alejandro González Iñárritu, with a screenplay by Iñárritu and Mark L. Smith, and starring Leonardo DiCaprio and Tom Hardy.

Punke wrote the novel while on a plane, after reading a few lines in a history book about the real-life American frontier fur trapper Hugh Glass. Punke was also working at the law firm Mayer Brown at the time he started the book (1997). The book took a total of four years to complete and according to his brother Tim, Punke actually caught pneumonia at least four times during the writing process. Punke also did extensive research on Glass, including setting up and testing actual hunting traps.

## Appendix 2

### Synopsis of "The Revenant"

The novel the Revenant was first published on June 10, 2002, it received critical acclaim and became a bestseller. The novel's story was later adapted into the 2015 film of the same name, directed by Alejandro G. Iñárritu and starring Leonardo DiCaprio. The Revenant marked DiCaprio's first Academy Award win for best actor, and also won Oscars for director and cinematography. This novel is set in 18th century American history where the main actor, Hugh Glass (DiCaprio), is forced to survive and find his way back to civilization after he experiences a terrible bear attack. Despite being injured, the feather trapper travels through the harsh and snowy terrain to track down the former team member who betrayed him. Real biography Hugh Glass is an American border guard and fur trapper who survives a bear attack and then travels hundreds of miles alone to safety. Little is known about Glass's life before 1823 when she signed up for a fur trading expedition supported by William Henry Ashley. The group departed from St. Louis in March. A few months later, they are attacked by Native Americans, and Glass is lightly injured. In August, he was conducting reconnaissance near current Lemmon, South Dakota when he was attacked by a bear. Although the animal was killed according to some accounts, by Glass herself the incident left her seriously injured. He reportedly suffered a broken leg, a torn scalp, a stabbed throat, and multiple injuries. Believing he was seriously injured, the expedition leaders left two people, John Fitzgerald and Jim Bridger, to stay with Glass until he died. However, a few days later, Fitzgerald and Bridger decided to rejoin their group. They placed Glass in a shallow grave and left with his guns. It wasn't long before Glass regained enough strength to embark on the arduous journey to Fort Kiowa, near present-day Chamberlain, South Dakota. Over the next two months, he traveled about 200-300 miles (322-483 km). The details of his ordeal then take on legendary proportions, making it difficult to sort fact from fiction. After recuperating at Fort

Kiowa, Glass sets out to kill Bridger and Fitzgerald for abandoning him. During her journey to find the two men, Glass was reportedly attacked by Native Americans. After finding Bridger, Glass forgave her, as she was 19 years old at the time of the incident. Different accounts about Fitzgerald. Some say that Fitzgerald has joined the army and is thus safe from any retaliation by Glass. However, other sources claim that Glass found Fitzgerald and also forgave him. His legend lives on through articles and books as well as several films, including The Revenant (2015), in which Leonardo DiCaprio starred as Glass.
